We hope this location will make us more accessible to everyone. Scientists can come to us, or we can easily visit offices and labs to provide help. Accessibility to a computer lab will allow us to offer hands-on training in many of our electronic resources, including databases, online journals, and EndNote. Our satellite location will be electronic only, but easy shuttle access to our main library on the FNLCR campus will permit us to fulfill the print needs of our users. The Library staff is very excited about this new venture. **TED**, a nonprofit devoted to **Ideas Worth Spreading**, began as a conference bringing together the most fascinating thinkers from three worlds: **Technology, Entertainment, Design**. Since then its scope has become even broader with over 1,100 talks and performances from TED and partners now freely available. All talks on the award-winning **TEDTalks** video site are subtitled in English, and many are subtitled in various languages. Videos are released under a Creative Commons license, so they can be freely shared and reposted. The goal of the Talks is "to stir your curiosity."

There are annual conferences including **TEDMED 2012**, a conference that addresses innovations in health and medicine, recently simulcast live to the NIH community. **TED** also includes the award-winning **TEDTalks** video site, the **Open Translation Project** and **TED Conversations**, the inspiring **TED Fellows** and **TEDx programs**, and the annual **TED Prize**. The two annual TED conferences, challenge participants to give the talk of their lives in 18 minutes or less.

## Book Club Focuses on Cancer Research

The Reading Diversions Book Club will be focusing on National Cancer Research Month in May. We will be reading the Pulitzer Prize winning book ***The Emperor of All Maladies: a Biography of Cancer*** by Siddhartha Mukherjee as our non-fiction selection. This bestseller is the story of cancer from its first documentation thousands of years ago to the present day efforts to conquer it. Our fiction choice for this month is ***The Honest Look*** by Jennifer L. Rohn who is also a cell biologist. This novel gives a unique perspective of life in a corporate laboratory in the city of Amsterdam. It tells of the secrets and difficult decisions a young researcher encounters when she starts a new job at a start-up biotech company in the Netherlands.

We will discuss both of these books on May 31, 2012 in Conference Room A in Building 549 from 12:00 p.m. to 1:00 p.m. You are welcome to bring your lunch. The discussion is open to anyone who has read either of the books. If you would like to borrow a copy of either title before the discussion, please contact the Library. ## Library Table @ the Spring Research Festival



The **Henry Stewart Talks** is a collection of over 1,000 specially prepared animated audiovisual presentations with synchronized narration by world-leading scientists in the biomedical and life sciences. The collection is organized into comprehensive series, regularly updated with new presentations constantly becoming available. You may browse through the series or search for a talk covering a subject of interest.

Recently added series include **Good Laboratory Practice: Principles, Compliance and Mutual Recognition**, consisting of talks on principles of GLP, compliance monitoring, and standard operating procedures, among others. Also added is a series on **Protein Homeostasis: Folding proteins and maintaining the protein-protein interaction networks**.

**Dictionary of Natural Products (DNP)** is a comprehensive database of 170,000 natural products which includes names and synonyms, formulae, chemical structures, CAS Registry Numbers, extensive source data, uses and applications, physical state, melting point, boiling point, pKa, and key literature citations, searchable by text or substructure.
