"How to Get Published in a Research Journal"

Knowing the best way to structure your scientific paper, identify the most appropriate journal, and understand the peer-review process is critical to getting your work published. The Scientific Library can help with this process by hosting an informative workshop about publishing journal articles.

"How to Get Published in a Research Journal" will provide practical advice on the steps to take before writing a paper, how to develop and submit a manuscript, what editors and publishers are looking for, and how to deal with referee comments. Sensitive areas such as publishing ethics, plagiarism, and duplicate publishing will also be addressed.

Representatives from a major publisher will visit NCI at Frederick on **Monday, May 16**, to offer valuable guidance to all scientists, beginners and veterans alike, on how to improve your publishing opportunities. The workshop will be held in the **Auditorium of Building 549 beginning at 1:00 p.m., and will be videocast to the ATRF, Room E1201**. Registration is not required. Light refreshments will be provided by the vendor.

We encourage everyone who publishes to take the time to attend this workshop, either in person in Building 549, or via videocast at the ATRF. Take advantage of this valuable opportunity to increase your publishing knowledge.

Sharing Research in Plain Language with Kudos

Kudos is a free resource that encourages authors to use plain language to maximize the use and citation of their published work. After setting up an account, you have the opportunity to create a selected list of your publications (ORCID lists may be imported) and add short summaries of your work, as well as personal statements on the work's background or importance. Students working with you over the summer may be good audiences to test the comprehensiveness of your summaries, or they may be helpful in writing draft summaries. Once your publications are explained, you may share links to this information via email and social networks. Kudos allows you to follow the effect of the different places you share it, providing metrics on full text downloads, citations, and attention from news sources and on social media. Faculty of 1000 is a post-publication peer review service that comprehensively and systematically highlights and evaluates the most interesting articles published in the biomedical sciences, based on the recommendations of a faculty of over 10,000 of the world's leading scientist and clinicians, including a number of NCI at Frederick researchers.
