As you may have noticed, the newsletter of the Scientific Library has undergone quite an overhaul.


'Inside the Library' was selected as the new title by library staff, after which a new logo and layout were designed by Susie Culler, Martha Summers, and Pam Zimmerman.

New Service: Emailing Journal Articles

Beginning March 1st, NCI-Frederick employees can have certain articles sent to their email accounts rather than delivered through the mail. For some time now, the Scientific Library has been testing this new service.

During the test phase, some patrons were given the option of receiving requested documents directly in their email accounts. If the requested article was in the library's print or online collections, a PDF file of the article was created or downloaded and then emailed to the requestor.

Because the test phase was such an overwhelming success, the Library has decided to offer this service to the entire NCI-Frederick community. Simply indicate email as your preferred mode of delivery when requesting articles.




In February the **Scientific Library, Occupational Health Services**, and the **Frederick Employee Diversity Team** combined forces to present a three-part program about HEART DISORDERS.

Part One was a **Book Discussion**. A number of NCI-Frederick employees met to discuss the book **TAKING ON HEART DISEASE** by Larry King. This book offers 18 first-person celebrity accounts, including King’s triple-bypass surgery, and pairs them with advice from expert cardiologists. Each story is used to illustrate key aspects of how to spot, diagnose, and survive heart disease. Copies of this book are in the Library’s collection, so anyone with a valid NCI-Frederick barcode can check one out.

Part Two of our program was a **Science in the Cinema/Diversity Movie**. The movie is **SOMETHING’S GOTTA GIVE**, a 2003 comedy starring Jack Nicholson, Diane Keaton, and Keanu Reeves. The movie tells the story of an older man (Nicholson) who suffers a heart attack at the home of his younger girlfriend’s mother (Keaton.) Reeves plays the cardiac doctor caring for Nicholson. A DVD copy of this movie is available for check out from the Library.

Part Three of our program was an **invited speaker**. Dr. John Vitarello, a local cardiologist, spoke to NCI-Frederick personnel about heart disease, how to prevent it, and how to live with it. We made a videotape of Dr. Vitarello’s talk, which is available to check out from the Library.

Faculty of 1000 – “Hidden Jewels”

The Library provides NCI-Frederick employees with site access to **Faculty of 1000**, an online research service and current awareness tool which highlights and reviews interesting papers published in the biological sciences. Reviews are based on the recommendations of over 1000 selected leading researchers who comprise the “Faculty,” which includes a number of your colleagues at NCI-Frederick and NIH.

One unique feature of the service is the **Hidden Jewels** list which displays papers that have been selected by evaluators from less widely read journals, those which you may have missed but which are rated highly on **Faculty of 1000**. This list is compiled daily and includes papers evaluated within the previous month. For those of you who can’t get enough of lists, you can also view the “Current Top 10,” “All Time Top 10,” and “Most Viewed Top 10” papers.
