In an effort to provide enhanced access to America's historic newspapers, the National Endowment for the Humanities and the Library of Congress as part of the National Digital Newspaper Program (NDNP), present ***Chronicling America: Historic American Newspapers***. On this site you may search and read over 226,000 pages of public-domain newspapers from California, Florida, Kentucky, New York, Utah, Virginia, and the District of Columbia published between 1900 and 1910. You may also find information about American newspapers published between 1690-present.

### Principles of Pharmacology Course Free at NCI-Frederick

The PRINCIPLES OF CLINICAL PHARMACOLOGY course that is held at the NIH Clinical Center will be video-conferenced to the NCI-Frederick campus in Conference Room B of the Conference Center in Building 549 on Thursday evenings, 6:30 p.m. – 7:45 p.m., from September 6, 2007 through April 24, 2008. The course provides an introductory review of pharmacokinetics, drug metabolism and transport, assessment of drug effects, drug therapy in special populations, and contemporary drug development.

The title of the textbook is **Principles of Clinical Pharmacology**, 2nd edition, by Arthur J. Atkinson Jr., et al. You may purchase the book at various bookstores and online resources at a cost of approximately \$100. The Scientific Library has a copy available for use within the Library only. It may not be borrowed.

## 2006 Data Now Available in Journal Citation Reports (JCR)

Thomson Scientific has announced that the 2006 data has now been posted to the **Journal Citation Reports (JCR)** site. Using JCR, a researcher can identify journals in which to publish based on ranking by impact factor, confirm how frequently an author's articles have been cited, and identify journals relevant to their research. Covering more than 7,500 journals in the sciences and social sciences, JCR allows users to view a group of journals by subject, publisher, or country/territory, search for a specific journal, or view a list of all journals. Researchers may also select a year from 1998 through 2006 and choose the JCR Science edition or the JCR Social Sciences edition. ## Marquis Who's Who in American Politics

**Marquis Who's Who** on the Web recently added the complete database of **Who's Who in American Politics** with over 36,000 biographies of key figures in today's political arena. Full biographies of cabinet members, governors, state legislatures, members of Congress, Supreme Court justices, as well as ambassadors, advisors, party officials, political journalists, and others are included. The new database joins other recent additions, **Who's Who in American Art** and **Who's Who in American History**. ## Document Delivery via Web of Science

Earlier in the year, NIH announced the migration of **Web of Science** to the **ISI Web of Knowledge** platform. As a result, NCI-Frederick users of Web of Science no longer had an option for ordering documents that were not available full-text from the results display. To resolve this problem, a link to our "NCI-Frederick Online Request Form" was added to the form on the pop-up window which appears when you click on the  button. This option will only appear when there is no direct connection to full-text. There is also a link, "View the record for this item in the NCI-Frederick's online catalog," which allows you to check our holdings for the title. If online access is available, you will be directed to the journal's homepage. The button also appears in other databases such as **EMBASE**, **Ovid**, **Scopus**, **PubMed**, and **Google Scholar**.
