Current Literature Awareness Alert

Not sure what a Current Literature Awareness Alert is? Current Literature Awareness Alerts send new articles on a specific topic to your e-mail. A number of databases, such as **PubMed** and **Web of Science**, have the ability to create Alerts. The database will run a specific search every week, month, etc. (whichever you specify) and send the new results straight to your e-mail. These Alerts are a quick and easy way to stay up-to-date on the current literature.

Interested in having a librarian review existing Alerts or help you set up new Alerts? Marci Brandenburg, the Scientific Library's new Biosciences Informationist, can assist you in your office or at the Library. With a MS in biology and a Masters of Science and Information, Marci can assist you with more than just Alerts, for she can help you with any of your scientific informational needs! SciVee - 'YouTube' for Scientists

The National Science Foundation (NSF), the Public Library of Science (PLoS), and the San Diego Supercomputing Center (SDSC) announced a new website billed as a 'YouTube' for scientists. **SciVee** provides community tools for researchers of all levels to share their science, connect with their peers, and respond to scientific data. Researchers can see and hear scientists describe their scientific research, join specific interest communities, participate in scientific discussions, and create comprehensive multimedia presentations of their own research. For example, **SciVee** invites scientists to make their research known by combining their published scientific articles with a corresponding video into an online presentation called a 'SciVee pubcast.' The community can then freely view the presentation and engage in virtual discussions with the author and other **SciVee** members via commentary, community discussions and blogging features.

2007 Data Now Available in Journal Citation Reports (JCR)

Thomson Scientific has announced that the 2007 data has now been posted to the Journal Citation Reports (JCR) site. Using JCR, a researcher can identify journals in which to publish based on ranking by impact factor, confirm how frequently an author's articles have been cited, and identify journals relevant to their research. Covering more than 7,500 journals in the sciences and social sciences, **JCR** allows users to view a group of journals by subject, publisher, or country/territory, search for a specific journal, or view a list of all journals. Researchers may also select a year from 1998 through 2007 and choose the JCR Science edition or the JCR Social Sciences edition. To access **JCR**, visit the Library's homepage at http://www-library.ncifcrf.gov, and click on the title in the "Databases" list under the "Electronic Resources" heading. JCR is also available via the Web of Knowledge interface at http://www.isiknowledge.com .

"What Can I Do?" - An Environmental Awareness Campaign

Throughout 2008 the Scientific Library staff is sponsoring a year-long "What Can I Do?" – An Environmental Awareness Campaign. The purpose of this campaign is to help all of us learn how, in both small and big ways, we can make our world a better place. Our plans have included, or will include, speakers, movies, documentaries, demonstrations, and information tables.

We began this campaign in March with a **Public Science in the Cinema** program at Hood College. We showed former Vice President Al Gore's Academy Award-winning documentary **An Inconvenient Truth**, followed by a panel of speakers from Hood College who discussed the information in the documentary.

In April we showed a series of episodes from the television series *Living With Ed*. Ed Begley, Junior is an actor and a dedicated environmentalist. In this reality series from the HGTV network, he is trying to show his wife how they can live an environmental life.

During May's Spring Research Festival, we brought *An Inconvenient Truth* to the NCI-Frederick campus. We showed the documentary multiple times, and then hosted a talk by Dr. John Beutler, Staff Scientist in the Molecular Targets Development Program. Dr. Beutler discussed the impact of global warming on the research at NCI-Frederick as it relates to the testing of organisms from around the world to find viable treatments for disease.

Beginning in June, and running through the end of August, we are showing the beautiful and amazing series **Planet Earth**.

The Scientific Library staff plans to incorporate the environmental theme into our program for July's **Take Your Child to Work Day (TYCTWD)**. The children will plant trees and decorate recycled bags in which they can transport their trees. Staff members will read the Dr. Seuss environmental story **The Lorax** to the children, who will then have the opportunity to select a "gently used" book to take home.

Although we've offered many programs so far in 2008, we're not finished yet! Plans for the rest of the year include a **Science in the Cinema** about weather and climate change, using the movie **The Day After Tomorrow** and hosting a speaker who will address the weather issues presented in the movie. We also plan to show the very current and relevant documentary from the National Geographic Society titled **Six Degrees Could Change The World**, which some people consider the non-fiction counterpart to **The Day After Tomorrow**. In **Six Degrees Could Change The World**, narrator Alec Baldwin illustrates the consequences of rising temperatures on Earth, one poignant degree at a time.

Other plans, such as observing "America Recycles Day," and hosting a speaker on solar heating, are being considered. We'd also like to hear any suggestions you may have, so please email the Library at **NCIFredLibrary**@ **mail.nih.gov** with your ideas.
