## Children with AIDS

### A Science in the Cinema Program

The Scientific Library is collaborating with Dr. Jeffrey Lifson, Director of the AIDS Vaccine Program and Head of the Retroviral Pathogenesis Section, SAIC-Frederick, to reschedule the **SCIENCE IN THE CINEMA** about "Children with AIDS." Originally scheduled for January, this program is now being held during the first two weeks of March. During the week of March 3 we showed the movie **The Cure**, the story of an 11-year-old boy with AIDS who is befriended by a neighbor boy. On Friday, March 14, beginning at 2:00 p.m. in the Auditorium of Building 549, **Dr. Katherine Luzuriaga**, Professor of Pediatrics and Molecular Medicine and Chief of the Division of Pediatric Immunology, Infectious Diseases, and Rheumatology, at the University of Massachusetts Medical School (UMMS), will talk about the movie and its theme of children with AIDS in her talk titled "**Pediatric HIV-1 Prevention and Treatment: A Global Perspective.**" We hope you will be able to attend this very relevant SCIENCE IN THE CINEMA. But if you cannot attend, remember that a DVD of the movie and a DVD of the speaker's talk will be available for checking out of the Library. The **Maryland People's Law Library** is a public resource providing access to legal-related information to Marylanders, helping to explain the law in easy-to-understand terms, as an extension of the existing legal information service to the general public provided by the Maryland State Law Library. Plans are underway to update and expand the site to provide additional free educational and state and federal legal resources to the public, including those who represent themselves in court. Launched in 1996, the **People's Law Library** has been supported by Maryland's non-profit legal services providers including legal aid programs, public interest attorneys, community advocacy groups, and the Maryland Legal Assistance Network (MLAN).

## Reading Diversions Book Club

The **READING DIVERSIONS BOOK CLUB** was formed to bring people together to read and discuss books for scientific interest, rather than for scientific research. ### Resource of the Month

The Scientific Library began promoting a "**RESOURCE OF THE MONTH**" in February 2008 to introduce the NCI-Frederick community to electronic resources that you may not use that often. February's resource was the **ISI WEB OF KNOWLEDGE** because of its recent redesign. In March, we will highlight **EMBASE**.

To help you get to know these resources each month, we will have a demonstration at lunch time one day. This will be a short overview in the Conference Center in Building 549 so that you can bring your lunch. No registration is required to attend. After the demonstration, the Library's Training Lab will be open so that you can have uninterrupted time to explore this resource for yourself. There will be no instruction during that time, but a Librarian will be there to answer questions.

### DiscoveryGate and Beilstein at the Library

When you need to find chemical, pharmacological, and biological information, remember that the Library provides access to **DISCOVERYGATE** and **BEILSTEIN**. These tools allow you to search 25 million chemical structures and over 17 million chemical transformations, as well as over 320 million scientifically measured facts, from reaction details to compound properties. One computer in the Library is dedicated to these resources, and all NCI-Frederick employees and contractors are able to search for free anytime during the Library's operating hours.

# *New Requirements for Public Access to NIH-supported Research*

On December 26 2007, **The Consolidated Appropriations Act of 2007** (H.R. 2764) was signed into law, requiring NIH to make public the results of any research it supports. NIH has released new guidance on the *Revised Policy on Enhancing Public Access to Archived Publications Resulting from NIH-Funded Research* (<http://grants.nih.gov/grants/guide/notice-files/NOT-OD-08-033.html>). **Effective April 7, 2008**, it stipulates that investigators who publish journal articles reporting on research that used NIH funding are now **required** to submit their final, peer reviewed manuscript to **PubMed Central (PMC)** (<http://www.pubmedcentral.nih.gov>) **within 12 months of publication.**

**Citing Requirements:** *“As of May 25, 2008, when citing an article in NIH applications, proposals, and progress reports that falls under the Policy, and was authored or co-authored by you or arose from your NIH award, you must include the **PubMed Central reference number (PMCID)**. If a PMCID is not yet available, include the **NIH Manuscript Submission system reference number (NIHMS ID)** instead. This policy includes applications submitted to the NIH for the **May 25, 2008 due date and subsequent due dates.**”* (See also: <http://publicaccess.nih.gov/FAQ.htm#c6>)


