If It's all Free on PubMed, Why is the Scientific Library Paying for Journal Subscriptions?

Part 2

Authors whose published works result from NIH-funded research are required to submit their full-text articles to **PubMed Central** (PMC) to be made available free to the public within 6-12 months of publication. Despite this requirement, not all articles are submitted to PMC. Another unique situation involves "open access" journal articles. In some instances journal publishers will decide to allow a single article from a journal issue to be made available free to anyone. In these cases the publisher links in **PubMed** and other databases will gain you access to the full-text journal article for free. You will not, however, be able to see other articles in that same journal issue, the ones NOT designated "open access," unless the Scientific Library or its consortium pays for the journal subscription.

So you may ask, how can I obtain access to articles the Scientific Library pays for? As long as you are searching on a computer that is linked to the private network here at the FNL or at the ATRF, the IP address for that computer is matched with those registered by the Scientific Library with the publisher. You can obtain this same access when you are using a computer off campus, for example at home, in one of two ways:

- a) by using your VPN account, which transfers you to the private network for your institution from outside
- b) by using your Library account, which is set up to recognize you as entitled to access anything that the Library has licensed for use.

In either case, the full-text links will not work if your computer address is not recognized by the publisher. This only happens after the National Library of Medicine makes an agreement with the publisher, someone pays for the subscription, and the Library establishes the links to the private network.

NIH Research Portfolio Online Reporting Tools (NIH RePORT)

In addition to carrying out its scientific mission, the NIH promotes public accountability. **NIH RePORT** provides access to reports, data, and analyses of NIH research activities, including information on NIH expenditures and the results of NIH-supported research. For example, you may search a repository of NIH-funded research projects and access publications and patents resulting from that funding.

OneSearch Available Soon

For years the staff of the Scientific Library has been asked the same question from our users. “I don’t have time to search different databases individually. Why can’t I search everything at the same time?” With the new resource **OneSearch**, that wish may come true!

When it is available, **OneSearch** will be a fast way to search Scientific Library collections – journal articles, books, media, and more – using a single search box. A large central index is compiled from over 7000 publishers and content providers, and covers over 90% of the Library’s electronic journal subscriptions. **OneSearch** is powered by Summon from Serials Solutions.

Entering search terms in the **OneSearch** search box will allow users to simultaneously search the Scientific Library’s online catalog, most of the Library’s online journals, the full-text of the online books collection, and databases such as **Web of Science** and **PubMed**. A click or two from the results screen may take users to full-text journal articles or book chapters, or will provide availability information for print books.

The staff of the Scientific Library is very excited about the searching possibilities that **OneSearch** offers. We will let everyone know as soon as this new resource is available for use.

Resources of the Month

March – **Professional Development Collection**

The Library has a number of resources on loan to us from Human Resources groups at FNLCR or NIH. All materials are located on shelving just outside our public computing area and may circulate for four weeks. In this collection are three areas of specialty -

- **Career Development** - contains materials on loan from the NIH Office of Intramural Training & Education Career Library. Topics include career advice, resumes, and networking, among others.
- **Employee Development** - has resources on loan from SAIC’s Training and Development department to supplement their various Employee Training Workshops. Topics currently include conflict resolution, “people skills,” and more.
- **Project Management** - items are on loan from the SAIC Project Coordination Office and include topics such as project leadership, risk management, earned value, and more.

Forty Years of Service Recognized

In the early 1970's, a gallon of gasoline cost 40 cents, bell bottoms were the fashion, the war in Vietnam was winding down, but the war on cancer was in its infancy. In October 1971, President Nixon designated Fort Detrick as a cancer research center. The first contractor at the center was Litton Bionetics.

It was in these initial days of scientific investigation that Darlene Clements started working at Fort Detrick, and she's been here ever since. She was first assigned to many different departments to do photocopying, and spent a good deal of time in Publications. About a year after she started working for Litton, she began her job at the Scientific Library and never left us. Her job has required her to do a lot of shelving over the years. She has learned how to use many different copiers and the computer as well. Recently she's been assigned to the circulation desk. She was here for the Library's move from Building 426 to Building 549 in 1986, the library automation of the card catalog in the early 1990's, the building expansion in 1994, and the move from print to electronic journal format.

To celebrate such a momentous occasion, many of Darlene's former co-workers sent cards and letters to honor her years of service. This included Karen Patrias, who initially hired Darlene for her job. One colleague's note mentioned, if Darlene had a nickel for the number of article photocopies she'd made over the years, she'd be a millionaire!
